



# How to Report a Concern

### 5 Potential Reports



#### **Safe Church Team**

We use the thumb to remember because usually once you have told the Safe Church Team, they will step in.



#### **Police**


We use this finger to remember because sometimes calling the police will be the first thing we need to do.

## Reportable Conduct

We use the longest finger to remember because an allegation of reportable conduct will usually require an investigation.




We use the ring finger to remember because the Ministry Standards Team is committed to supporting you.



## Mandatory Reporting

We use the little finger to remember because we are protecting the little people.

## Reporting: Safe Church Team



# Any incident, concern or issue should be reported to the **Safe Church Team**.


- The Safe Church Team will take whatever steps are necessary and get back to you.
- If you need to make a report yourself, the Safe Church Team can help and support you.

## Reporting: Police



### In an emergency, call police immediately.

If you are aware that a serious criminal offence has been committed, you MUST inform police. Failure to report is a criminal offence.


Any adult who knows a child abuse offence has been committed must inform police.

(Crimes Act 1900 (NSW) s316A; Crimes Act 1900 (ACT) s66AA; Crimes Act 1958 (Vic s327).

It is a reasonable excuse not to inform police if:

- you know that police have already been informed
- there are reasonable grounds to fear for the safety of the victim or any other person (other than the offender)
- the victim is now an adult and does not want police to be informed.

# What staff and volunteers are covered?

- Anyone who is required to have a Working With Children Check for their work with the church,
- Includes any conduct, even if it is not in a church context.

### How and when to report

- Anyone who has information must tell the Head of Relevant Entity,
- Head of Relevant Entity <u>must</u> notify the OCG within 7 business days.




## Reporting: Reportable Conduct (NSW)

#### What is reportable conduct?

Where it is <u>alleged</u> that a staff member or volunteer subject to the scheme has engaged in one (or more) of the following:

- a. a sexual offence against, with or in the presence of a child.
- b. sexual misconduct against, with or in the presence of a child.
- c. ill-treatment of a child.
- d. neglect of a child.
- e. an assault against a child.
- f. an offence under section 43B or 316A of the Crimes Act 1900,
- g. behaviour that causes significant emotional or psychological harm to a child.

## Reporting: Ministry Standards




#### Please call Ministry Standards\* if

- the Safe Church Team need advice, or
- there has been a report to any government department, or
- the matter involves an accredited or recognised minister / endorsed ministering person.

## Reporting: Mandatory Reporting



If you are a Mandatory Reporter and you are concerned that a child or children are at risk of harm then you must report this to the relevant Child Protection Body.

\* Each jurisdiction has their own definitions of who is a Mandatory Reporter and what concerns must be reported.



## Reporting: Mandatory Reporting (NSW)<sup>4</sup>

### Who is a mandatory reporter?

(in the church context)

Anyone in religious ministry or 'providing religion-based activities to children'

#### What must be reported?

If you are a mandatory reporter

AND you have reason to think that a child is

at risk of significant harm

AND that reason arose as part of your role

THEN you MUST make a report to the

**Department of Communities and Justice.** 

# Threshold: "Child or young person at risk of significant harm"

Current concerns for safety, welfare or wellbeing due to:

- Physical, psychological, medical or educational needs not being met; and/or
- Risk of physical or sexual abuse; and/or
- Incidents of domestic violence in the household; and/or
- Parent or caregiver acting in such a way as to risk causing psychological harm.
